Balluta Bay back in service for another four years

The Balluta Bay re-entered into service on 15 August as part of EMSA's network of stand-by oil pollution response vessels. Based in Malta, Balluta Bay had previously been contracted as a replacement vessel. Both vessel and crew have plenty of experience therefore in the assigned task. She is now ready to begin a four-year service period after a renovation process dramatically improved her capabilities. Balluta Bay has increased storage capacity to 2 800m³, renewed cargo handling and recovery systems and is certified to operate with products whose flash point is below 60°C.

MONTENEGRO GETS TO GRIPS WITH THIRD MARITIME SAFETY PACKAGE

A two-day training course was held by EMSA in Montenegro as part of a project financed by the European Commission's Directorate General for Enlargement. The project is geared



towards EU candidate and potential candidate countries and is designed to help them align their national maritime safety legislation with that of the EU. Montenegro's transport minister, Andrija Lompar, gave a welcome speech in

Maritime safety legislation has been prepared for adoption by parliament and Montenegro is actively cooperating with the relevant regional agreement on Port State Control. Recently, Montenegro gained cooperative member status at the Paris MoU.
